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ARTIST JAN TICHY TO TRANSFORM THE MSU BROAD ART MUSEUM IN NEXT SIGNATURE COMMISSION SERIES EXHIBITION

The exhibition will be an invitation for visitors to renegotiate their connections to the rhythms of nature, circadian cycles, and the broader environment.

East Lansing, MI – The Eli and Edythe Broad Art Museum at Michigan State University (MSU Broad Art Museum) is thrilled to announce the second exhibition in the museum's Signature Commission Series, *Jan Tichy: Darkness.* Opening January 24, 2026, the exhibition will feature a newly commissioned, site-responsive artwork by artist Jan Tichy, transforming the heart of the museum into a reimagined architectural and multi-sensorial experience.

At its core, *Darkness* will be an invitation for visitors to renegotiate their connections to the rhythms of nature, circadian cycles, and the broader environment. For humans, our bodies carry these rhythms within us. Within each of our 30 trillion cells is an internal, circadian clock that is tuned to the roughly 24-hour period of our days—to the rise and fall of darkness (and light). But

with the invention of artificial light came the erasure of darkness across many landscapes, wreaking havoc on the lives of many. *Darkness* asks us, how can we re-embrace our relationship with the dark? How might we rediscover ourselves, our health and well-being, under the cover of darkness?

"We are thrilled to have Jan Tichy return to the museum to participate in our Signature Commission Series," commented Steven L. Bridges, senior curator and director of curatorial affairs. "Jan's inquisitiveness and interest in learning from and with campus partners, combined with his unparalleled artistic vision, all come together in a truly unique project that is at once of a particular time and place, and yet touches on something far deeper within us."

Artist Jan Tichy (b. 1974, Prague, Czechoslovakia; lives and works in Chicago) is a contemporary artist and educator, working at the intersection of video, sculpture, architecture, and photography. His conceptual work and large, public art projects engage communities in socially and politically engaged conversations. In creating *Darkness* at the MSU Broad Art Museum, Tichy worked across disciplines and with a range of different MSU laboratories and researchers, including forging partnerships with the Hoffmann Lab, Yan Lab, Bug House, and Controlled-Environment Lighting Lab (CELL).

"The collaborations with four MSU labs around the theme of darkness and its influence on human life is not about illustrating research," noted Tichy, reflecting on the co-creative processes he has developed across campus. "But about inspiring new perspectives and sharing our different audiences, so visitors to the museum have more direct access and experience with the questions shaping the work of these innovative labs and campus organizations."

Darkness is the second exhibition in the newly minted Signature Commission Series at the MSU Broad Art Museum. With the MSU Broad Art Museum's efforts to provide world-class, unparalleled art experiences, the Signature Commission Series is part of the forward-looking, innovative vision for the museum as it moves into the next decade of its existence.
